PROGRAM HIGHLIGHTS  
SPRINGFIELD FAIR

**HORSE RACING:** Horse racing continues to be the main event for thrill and excitement at the annual fair. A closely contested race brings the folks in the grand stand as well as those at track side to the peak of excitement found nowhere else during the whole year. The track is in the best condition in many years. There are many county owned horses this year who will bring many local followers with them to cheer them on to victory. Visit the race stables and take a close look at the many fine horses this year. Racing will be held on the first and last days.

**EXHIBITION HALL—**Mrs. Dorothy H. McGraw, Lee, Maine

The big exhibition hall will be the center of attraction this year with larger and more varied exhibits and displays than ever before. Nearly everyone seems to be interested in potatoes, beans, big pumpkins and what not and they will all be here for your inspection. The commercial exhibits will be more varied this year and will show and demonstrate nearly every labor saving device that may be used in home or on the farm. Come also the first and last days to get the full benefit of these displays as you will then have more time for examination and comparison of various products.

The 4-H Clubs will put on the largest exhibit they have ever attempted at this fair with the best of their work from 400 members being shown. There will be Grange booths, Fancy Work, Flowers and Quilts from county ladies who are competing for first honors.

Outdoor exhibits will include tractors, farm machinery, trucks, machinery and other things. It is not only fun to go to the fair but it also pays through the chance to pick up so many new ideas, see farm machinery in action, and find out what is new and best in home and farm equipment.

HORSE PULLING is increasing in popularity each year so this season it will receive more attention and more money will be offered the teams. The pulling will be held on the first and last day.

MIDWAY: Thomas F. Keefe of the Columbia Shows is bringing a Carnival new to Springfield this season. Everything newly painted, new canvas this year, new games, six rides including the famous kids ride the "MINIATURE TRAIN" and all the old standbys. A big BEANO and some shows.

100th ANNUAL EXHIBITION  
 SPRINGFIELD FAIR  
 RULES AND REGULATIONS

Interpretations of all rules and regulations will be made by the officers in charge of the halls, exhibits or contests and collectively they will also make decisions on all questions that arise and are not covered in these regulations.

Articles, animals and exhibits are at owner's risk and expenses but the society will use diligence and precaution to guard against fire, theft, damage or loss.

Other premiums and awards for articles not listed in this book may be made if recommended by the judges and approved by the management.

No premium will be paid on articles, animals, exhibits, manufactured goods or performances unless adjudged worthy by the judges even though there be no competition.

No article or animal shall receive more than one premium except farm stock which also may be entered as part of a herd.

No exhibitor who wins one premium on an entry can win the other two premiums by making duplicate entries.

All articles entered for premiums must be numbered and tagged by the entry clerk of each department.

Not more than two articles exhibited at previous fairs on these grounds will be eligible to premium awards.

Exhibits of Agricultural Clubs, Granges, Farm Bureaus and other societies are expected to be of a size and variety to be worthy of the premium offered. Judges may award a sum smaller than that given in the book for an exhibit that they do not deem entitled to the amount listed.

Ground space will be rented at reasonable rates for the display of automobiles, farm implements, eating or amusement places or for any other use that may be deemed of proper nature for this exhibition.

All articles, animals and exhibits are expected to be in place before noon of the first day of Fair and nothing will be entered after 3 P. M. of the first day and all exhibits to remain in place until 4 P. M. of the last day of the Fair, except by special ar-

angement with the management in the case of animals or unforeseen circumstances which require removal before the established hour.

No entrance fee of any kind being charged on exhibits by residents of Washington and Penobscot Counties, each exhibitor will be required to purchase his admission ticket the same as the general public.

Stalls, hay free to exhibitors of horses, cattle, but please notify the secretary as early as possible of the space required.

All articles sent by parcel post or express may be addressed to Dorothy McGraw, Sec. Lee, Maine, and will be entered at the proper time by the entry clerk and returned at the close of the Fair. Any person not having the means or proper conveyance of getting their exhibit to and from the park are requested to write the secretary who will arrange for proper transportation.
