The big exhibition hall will be the center of attraction this year with larger and more varied exhibits and displays than ever before. Nearly everyone seems to be interested in potatoes, beans, big pumpkins and what not and they will all be here for your inspection.

The 4-H Clubs will put on the largest exhibit they have ever attempted at this fair with the best of their work from 400 members being shown. There will be Grange booths, Fancy Work, Flowers and Quilts from county ladies who are competing for first honors.

Outdoor exhibits will include tractors, farm machinery, trucks, machinery and other things. It is not only fun to go to the fair but it also pays through the chance to pick up so many new ideas, see farm machinery in action, and find out what is new and best in home and farm equipment.

RULES AND REGULATIONS

Interpretation of all rules and regulations will be made by the officers in charge of the halls, exhibits or contests and collectively they will also make decisions on all questions that arise and are not covered in these regulations.

Articles, animals and exhibits are at owner's risk and expenses but the society will use diligence and precaution to guard against fire, theft, damage or loss.

Other premiums and awards for articles not listed in this book may be made if recommended by the judges and approved by the management.

PREMIUM LIST

No premium will be paid on articles, exhibits, animals, manufactured goods or performances unless adjudged worthy by the judges even though there be no competition.

No article or animal shall receive more than one premium except farm stock which also may be entered as part of a herd.

No exhibitor who wins one premium on an entry can win the other two premiums by making duplicate entries.

All articles entered for premiums must be numbered and tagged by the entry clerk of each department.

Any article receiving a cash premium at any previous fair of this Society is not entitled to any reward this year.

Exhibits of Agricultural Clubs, Granges, Farm Bureaus and other societies are expected to be of a size and variety to be worthy of the premium offered. Judges may award a sum smaller than that given in the book for an exhibit that they do not deem entitled to the amount listed.

Ground space will be rented at a reasonable rate for the display of automobiles, farm implements, eating or amusement places or for any other use that may be deemed of proper nature for this exhibition.

All articles, animals and exhibits are expected to be in place before noon of the first day of Fair and nothing will be entered after 3 P. M. of the first day and all exhibits to remain in place until 4 P. M. of the last day of the Fair, except by special arrangement with the management in the case of animals or unforeseen circumstances which require removal before the established hour.

Exhibition Hall will be open to receive entries all day Friday, Sept. 2nd and Saturday A. M.

No entrance fee of any kind being charged on exhibits by residents of Washington and Penobscot Counties, each exhibitor will be required to purchase his admission ticket the same as the general public.

Stalls free to exhibitors of horses, cattle, but please notify the secretary as early as possible of the space required.

All articles sent by parcel post or express may be addressed to Dorothy McGaw, Sec. Lee, Maine, and will be entered at the proper time by the entry clerk and returned at the close of the Fair. Any person not having the means or proper conveyance of getting their exhibits to and from the park are requested to write the secretary who will arrange for proper transportation.

DAIRY CATTLE

Entries with no competition shall be awarded not over \$100. for any one herd.

All dairy stock entered for premiums must be on the Fair Grounds by 4 o'clock on Friday, and remain on the grounds until four o'clock Monday.

The owner of any animal will be accountable for any damage that such animal may do, also for its safe keeping.

Persons who enter any animals as purebred must furnish satisfactory evidence of their being eligible to registration, or present the registration papers to the Secretary.

The committee shall in cases withhold premium when the animal or article is not worthy, even if there is no competition.

One foddering of hay and bedding will be furnished free by the management. A forage superintendent will be on the grounds from whom hay and grain may be purchased.

Exhibitors of Prize Winners must show animals in front of Grandstand if requested.

Sleeping quarters must be furnished by exhibitors. Owing to lack of room, stalls and pens must not be used for sleeping quarters or storage. Excellent tenting space will be furnished exhibitors free of charge.

Each exhibitor and wife will be entitled to one ticket and if showing five or more cattle, a helper's ticket may be issued. Additional tickets for helpers will be considered upon proper application to the management.

Revised Laws on Bangs Disease and Tuberculosis

"No Society shall be entitled to any share of the stipend unless it shall require all cattle to be shown or exhibited to have come from herds wherein all animals were negative to the tuberculin test within one year of the opening date of the show, and unless all cattle to be exhibited are from herds free of Bangs disease (brucellosis) as shown by the official blood tests made within 60 days of the opening date of the show, except:

I. Cattle from an accredited herd which has shown a clean test within 6 months;

II. Cattle from a certified vaccinated herd tested within 6 months with no animals to be exhibited over 18 months of age which are not negative to the test;

III. Cattle from a herd under official supervision which has had 2 negative tests, the last within 90 days of the date of the show; or

IV. Cattle under 6 months of age from herds not under quarantine.

PLEASE TAKE NOTICE

No dairy cattle will be entered unless accompanied by a certificate of test as required by law for both Bangs Disease and Tuberculosis.

The SECRETARY will be required to make a record of the dates of the above tests for exhibit to the State Inspector.

Ear tag numbers alone will not be accepted.
